DRAFT MINUTES (Verified with meeting transcript)

CENTRAL INTERSTATE LLRW COMMISSION ANNUAL MEETING THURSDAY, June 17, 2021 at 10:00 A.M.

In compliance with Commission Bylaws and Rules, a meeting notice announcing the date, time, location, and agenda availability was emailed to the interested public on Tuesday, May 18, 2021.

The Annual Meeting of the Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact Commission (CILLRWCC) was held Thursday, June 17, 2021 via Teleconference to take necessary action on meeting minutes, administrative budgets, and all other business to come before the Commission.

The meeting was called to order at approximately 10:02 a.m. and the first item agenda was for roll to be called. Responding to the roll call was Kelly Dixon, Oklahoma Commissioner and Chair; Scott Blackwell, Louisiana Commissioner; Richard Brunetti, Alternate Kansas Commissioner; and Scott Blackwell, Louisiana Commissioner.

The Administrator, Kristie Ann Valtierra; Alternate Oklahoma Commissioner, Mike Stickney; and Court Reporter, Christy Myers, Kendra Robin, Attorney, and Jon Roberts, previous Oklahoma Commissioner were also present on the conference call.

The Chair addressed the second agenda item to approve the minutes of the Special Teleconference held on Thursday, February 25, 2025. The commissioners nor the public made comments or corrections.

Motion was made by Louisiana and seconded by Kansas to approve the minutes.

Motion passed 3-0.

The Commission heard a brief report from the Administrator discussing the availability of the Commission's new website.

The Chair then addressed the next item on the agenda, the Chairperson Report. The chair introduced Kendra Robben as the new Compact Commission attorney. She advised that at the Special Meeting in February, the former attorney, Shawn Renner wasn't on the line, therefore; she contacted him. Mr. Renner informed the Chair that he retired and that began a quest for a new attorney. After reviewing several attorneys, the commissioners voted via email to allow Kendra Robben to serve as the Commission's attorney. After a brief introduction from Ms. Robben, the chair moved on to the next topic of Records Reduction and Retention. The Chair advised that the Commission pays annually for storage of multiple boxes of files, mostly relating to a litigation that occurred approximately 20 years ago. The chair suggested that it would be more economical to store these files in an electronic format. She stated that there are several factors that needed to be examined to determine what the Commission is legally required to retain and not retain. The Chair then asked for feedback from the other Commissioners. Rick Brunetti, Kansas Commissioner questioned whether the Commission currently had a record retention policy in place. The Chair stated that the she found that the bylaws stated what could be released to the public and what could not but did not see anything about retention. Mr. Brunetti then asked how federal or state statutes could affect the Commission's records retention policy. The Commission Attorney stated that Oklahoma has a general statute that covers record retention for agencies and commissions and could work with the Administrator to assure that the Commission's policy aligned with the federal and state statutes. Mr. Brunetti then asked if the Commission was able to digitize the documents, would the Commission be allowed to dispose of the paper documents. Ms. Robben advised that she needed to investigate further. The Chair then asked Mr. Jon Roberts, previous Oklahoma Commissioner, if he would like to comment. Mr. Roberts stated that he understood from the previous attorney that the Commission, not being a state or federal agency, is not beholding to state or federal statutes as long the Commission's policy was not in extreme violation of either. The Chair stated that with approval of the Commissioners, she would draft a task list for Ms. Robben and Ms. Valtierra and send it out to the Commissioners by the end of the month. The Commissioners agreed and the Chair moved on to the next topic, the Annual Audit. The Administrator advised that the Commission is closing out this year's books at the end of June 30th. Due to Covid and other circumstances the

Commission is two years behind on audits. The Administrator is working with the auditor to complete all three audits at the same time. The Administrator advised that the audits would be completed by the special meeting in November for approval.

The Chair moved onto the next agenda to hear Commissioners' Reports. The Chair began by discussing the current Commissioner of Arkansas, George Overbey and the vacant Arkansas Alternate Commissioner position. The Commission has been unsuccessful in reaching Mr. Overbey by email and telephone; however, he responded to a late invoice for Commission dues. The Chair advised that she would continue to reach out to Mr. Overbey and the appointing authority in Arkansas to assure the positions be filled for the Commission to have quorums in the future. The Chair then asked Rick Brunetti, Alternate Commissioner of Kansas to report on the status of membership in Kansas. Mr. Brunetti advised that he and his Division Director drafted and sent a memo to the Governor of Kansas to appoint a Commissioner to represent Kansas. Mr. Brunetti stated that it was sent over before the Covid Pandemic and he would follow up with the request. Louisiana did not have anything to report currently. The Chair stated that the Texas Compact Commission recently sent out an email indicating that they had been mandated to put together a contingency plan in the event they had disruption in disposal availability. Approximately 32 states use this Texas facility to dispose of low-level radioactive waste. The Chair gave a brief report of what contingency plan was to consist of.

The Chair moved to the next agenda item, Review and Approval of Contract to Reimburse Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality (ODEQ) for Administrator's Time. The Chair gave a brief history of the Commission's agreements to reimburse the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality for the Administrator's time. The Chair then discussed a proposed Professional Services Agreement draft that was prepared and sent to the Commissioners. The Chair advised that the current agreement would expire June 30, 2021 and the proposed agreement would begin on July 1, 2021. The Chair opened the floor for discussion or questions and then asked for a motion to approve the proposed Professional Services Agreement.

Motion was made by Kansas and seconded by Louisiana to approve the Professional Services Agreement.

Motion passed 3-0

Arkansas Commissioner had questions about annual dues and the Oklahoma Alternate Commissioner asked about the insurance and current cost for the audit. The Administrator explained that the insurance is a Crime Policy and the budgeted amount for the audit is for three years of service. The Chair opened the floor for further discussion and then asked for a motion to approve the budget.

Motion was made by Louisiana and seconded by Oklahoma to approve the budget.

minutes, it has updates from other months that you can look at. It's a really good website, so if you all want to check that out.

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OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Thank you, Kristie. The next item is the Chairperson Report. This is Kelly Dixon. The first thing I wanted to do is introduce Kendra Robin as the new Compact Commission attorney. Let me go backwards real quickly. Everybody should remember that at our February meeting, our former attorney, Shawn Renner, wasn't on the line and I contacted him afterwards and he informed me he had retired and so that started a quest for a new attorney, and as you guys know we found Kendra and voted for approval via email, and she is on the call with us this morning.

So, Kendra, I'll let you introduce yourself just briefly and we'll move on.

MS. ROBIN: Perfect. Yes. I'm

Kendra Robin, and I office here in Oklahoma

City. I am an attorney licensed in Oklahoma

and Kansas, originally from way out on a farm
in western Kansas, and then have been in

Oklahoma City ever since law school. I do corporate work mostly, so lots of corporate work and estate planning type things, and not as much litigation like your previous attorney has done but certainly, you know, lots of non-profit work and things like that, so I'm looking forward to helping you guys with whatever comes up or helping, you know, in whatever way I can.

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Thank you, Kendra. Does anyone have any questions for Kendra? Okay. We'll move on to the next topic which is Records Reduction and Retention.

I think this has sort of been a topic on our agendas for a while and we haven't really landed on anything firm. But I wanted to bring it up for discussion. We pay annually -- the Commission pays annually for storage of boxes and boxes and boxes of files, and I think a lot of them are related to the litigation that happened, I don't know, 20 years ago. And, so, it would be nice if we could get those in an electronic format and figure out the best way to store

them, and also figure out what legally we are compelled to retain and not retain. So there's kind of an exercise to go through and I would expect -- and I just wanted to get some feedback from the rest of the Commissioners to see if you thought this was something we should pursue.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Kelly, this is Rick Brunetti in Kansas. I do agree that it is something we need to pursue. I have a couple of questions. Let me go through with this one and maybe Kristie may be able to answer this question as well as one of the other Commissioners.

Do we presently have a record retention policy in place?

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: You know, I went through the -- I looked through the bylaws earlier this month looking specifically for that and did not find anything. There's a lot about releasing records and what can be released and cannot be released but I didn't see anything about retention. So I don't -- I think the answer is no. But we should probably double-check the bylaws. And I can

do that.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: And then the other question would be, what is presently in -- what is presently contained within a federal or a state statute that would dictate how long we are required to keep -- how long we're required to keep a record?

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: That, I do not know the answer to.

MS. ROBIN: This is Kendra Robin.

I might chime in for just a second.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Good.

MR. ROBIN: If that's okay. I -as you know I'm just brand new so I don't
have all the details about all of that yet
but I do believe that each state -- well, at
least, for sure Oklahoma and my quick Google
confirmed, I believe, Arkansas too. I just
didn't look at all the rest of them. But
each, at least here in Oklahoma, we have a
general statute that covers record retention
for agencies and commissions and things, and
I believe we're going to find similar things
and, you know, based on at least the little
bit of quick stuff I've done, I think that we

will need to make sure that we comply with whatever those are but in general I've been finding kind of a general record retention policy that has been passed by policy up here and in -- in the various states. So I think if we don't have a specific policy here, it's probably something that maybe I could work with Kristie on or -- I'm new, so I'm not sure exactly what your internal structure is but I think we need to find out what the statutes are and I think we need to check the statutes governing each state commission to make sure we're not violating any of them before we do anything.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Okay. And, Kendra, this is Rick Brunetti in Kansas.

Another question for you, would you consider if we were able to digitize the documents, at that point would, in your legal opinion, would we be able to dispose of the paper records?

MS. ROBIN: I don't know the answer to that yet because I saw some references to some things that those retention documents had to be kept in paper copy

(inaudible). So I think that that's part of the investigation was if we just digitize if that would -- would comply. But I think I'm going to have to check the statute in each state before I can tell you for sure.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Yeah. That would be very helpful. Thank you.

MS. ROBIN: Yeah.

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Those are very good questions, Rick. Thank you. Jon Roberts wants to say something.

MR. ROBERTS: Yeah. This is Jon Roberts, and while I'm officially here as a member of the public now, you should be -- be the Commissioner from Oklahoma for the Commission and also Chair, and so worked a lot with our former attorney and, you know, Kendra, one of things that he always explained when we came up with these legal questions on what to do on certain things, because as you know, you know, each state has their own records retention policies and all that kind of stuff. But, you know, he always explained it as, you know, as a Commission, we're not really a state agency, we're not a

federal agency, we're some kind of just sort 1 of nebulous quasi governmental entity that's 2 not really necessarily beholding to specific 3 states or the feds, and this is my 4 understanding of what he said. So, you know, 5 I'm thinking as a records retention policy we 6 may be able to, you know, kind of come up 7 with something that works for the Commission, 8 you know, as long as it's not, you know, 9 probably extreme violation of any -- of any 10 of the states or the federal government. 11 that might be something to consider when we 12 finally come up with whatever the official 13 policy is going to be. You know, we're not 14 necessarily beholding to Oklahoma's policy 15 because the Commission is now headquartered in 16 Oklahoma but we don't want to probably be in 17 complete disagreement with that either with 18 whatever we come up with. So I just wanted 19 to kind of throw that out there for 20 consideration. 21 MS. ROBIN: This is Kendra Robin 22 Thanks. I think that's probably very again. 23 I do think that -- that the -- for 24

example, just because that's the one I'm most

familiar with, the Oklahoma one does include Commissions, but I tend to agree that I think that we're going to find that what they have are kind of general policies that allow for destruction and that if as long as we don't, you know, run super afoul of anything, that hopefully, we're going to find that we can make our own policy and digitize things and that, you know, get rid of a bunch of that stuff, especially since it's so old.

MR. ROBERTS: This is Jon, again. I think Kelly is right. I think the vast majority of them probably is on the old litigation records back from the '80s and '90s. So. And I don't know how long generally that those kinds of things are supposed to be held. So.

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: So if -it sounds like there's some interest in this,
there's some research and homework that we
need to do. So I think probably, I'm just
going to throw out what I think is the next
step and see if you guys agree. It could be
that I sort of flesh out for Kristie and
Robin -- Kendra, I'm sorry -- and Kendra that

the tasks that need to be done which would 1 include researching state, federal statutes on 2 records retention, looking at whether 3 digitized documents can be considered official 4 records, and then, you know, verifying that 5 it's not already covered in our bylaws. 6 then I think one other thing I would throw in 7 there is asking Kendra to maybe touch base 8 with Shawn Renner who offered his -- to 9 share, do a data dump, basically, with 10 whoever is our new attorney. So I might 11 flesh that out and sort of get an estimate 12 from Kendra what the time required would be 13 and go from there if everybody thinks that's 14 a sound way to proceed. 15 LOUISIANA COMMISSIONER: This is 16 Scott Blackwell, Louisiana. I think that's a 17 good idea. 18 KANSAS COMMISSIONER: 19 Brunetti, Kansas, I agree as well. 20 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Okay. 21 don't think this is anything we need to vote 22 on. I think it's just a direction that we're 23 going to go so we can kick this can down the 24 road a little further. Not kick the can but 25

get some answers. So, thank you, guys. I appreciate your input and your questions. When I get that task list put together, I'll share it. I'll have Kristie share it with you guys and if it looks okay, let me know, if you have other ideas to add to it, let me know and we'll make sure that we get that done probably by the end of the month.

The next item is the Annual Audit
Discussion. I will throw this to Kristie.

MS. VALTIERRA: We are closing out this year's books at the end of June 30th. And everything will be -- because they get everything from the office -- pull everything from the bank and invoices or anything that we have, they pull those as well, or just have a letter sent stating that what they have agrees with what was given. And so that will go to him and he will have something back to us, and I can send that out to you. I mean it will be ready for our November Special Teleconference Meeting that we're having but it will -- surely it will be ready way before that for review just through email.

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: And I'm 1 going to add to what Kristie just said, which 2 is as we've spoke about in our last meeting 3 in February, we -- because of Covid and other reasons we got behind our schedule on our 5 audits and so all of those audits are going 6 to be completed and due on the same timeline. 7 So when we meet again in our special meeting 8 we will be reviewing and approving, I think, 9 three? 10 MS. VALTIERRA: Ves. 11 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Three 12 years, including this current year. 13 that's just a heads up that we're going to 14 get back on track and I hope it doesn't --15 it's not -- I hope it's a simple meeting but 16 that's sort of the plan going forward. 17 Are there any questions or comments 18 for discussion? 19 (No response) 20 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: 21 Hearing none, we'll move on to Item 5, which 22 is Commissioners Report. 23 The first thing we have on the Agenda 24 is the Status of Commission Membership.

Arkansas is not on the line this morning, or are you? Did you join? No. Okay.

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George Overbey is the current Commissioner and we do not have an alternate in Arkansas. We've have some trouble reaching George by email and by telephone, but he has responded to a late invoice for the Commission dues. So I'm not quite sure what's happening and we've been trying to reach out through the channels. So we're going to continue -- I am going to continue to try to reach him and to reach the appointing authority in Arkansas to make sure that we also have an alternate because I think that will help make sure we have quorums in the future going forward. And then, Rick, I will turn it over to you for report on the status of membership in Kansas.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Okay. I have spoken to my -- pardon me, I'm sorry. This is Rick Brunetti in Kansas. I had spoken to my Division Director, the gentleman's name is Leo, and he is a Director and Assistant Secretary for the Division of Environment within the Kansas Department of

Health and Environment. We had drafted and 1 sent a memo to our Governor through our 2 3 secretary in regards to appointment of Leo as the -- as the Commissioner for Kansas since 4 he sets as the Division Director for the 5 Division of Environment. That -- I can tell 6 you that that memo was sent over to the 7 Governor's office right before Covid hit. 8 I am absolutely sure that there has been no 9 movement on that particular subject but I 10 will follow up with -- I will follow up with 11 Leo and determine if he wants to go ahead and 12 make another request to the Governor's office 13 now that things have cooled off a bit in 14 regards to the Covid. So let me check with 15 him and (inaudible) course of action, either 16 to -- essentially have the Governor's office 17 determine what direction they want to go in 18 regards to an appointment for the Commissioner 19 as opposed to the -- as opposed to me setting 20 in as Alternate Commissioner. 21 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: We love to 22

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: We love to have you as the Alternate Commissioner, it would just be nice to have the full slate.

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KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Yes. I

would certainly continue to act in that capacity (inaudible).

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Great.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Because -
OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Well at

this -- I'm sorry. Go ahead.

to say because that is a -- that is a political appointment and it has to go through senate confirmation and so, you know, dropping off as an alternate wouldn't make much sense because we would have to essentially get someone else approved through our full -- through our full Kansas Senate and as long as, you know, as long as my secretary -- the Secretary of the Department and the Deputy Secretary would want to have me in this role, I'm certainly willing and eager to serve.

OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: That's great. Thank you. Rick, you can tell Leo that Kelly Dixon says to join on in because it will be just like the good old days at Tar Creek Superfund Site.

KANSAS COMMISSIONER: Okay. Fair

enough. 1 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: We worked 2 together years ago. 3 KANSAS COMMISSIONER: All right. 4 Cool stuff. Great. 5 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: Does anyone 6 have any questions or comments for Rick? 7 (No response) 8 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: I really 9 appreciate you, Rick, taking the initiative to 10 get that done, it's an important thing that 11 needs to get done. 12 The next item is the Reports on 13 Activities and States that may be of interest 14 to the Commission. Does anyone have 15 anything? 16 LOUISIANA COMMISSIONER: This is 17 Scott Blackwell, Louisiana. We don't have 18 anything right now. 19 OKLAHOMA COMMISSIONER: I'm going 20 to go ahead and -- this is Kelly Dixon in 21 Oklahoma. I'm going to go ahead and mention 22 something that's going on in the radiation 23 disposal world, just because I found it of 24

interest and I think it probably impacts our

Commission in -- or the states in our Commission, anyway. The Texas Compact Commission recently sent out an email indicating that they had been mandated to put together a contingency plan in the event that they had disruption in disposal availability, and apparently 31, 32 states use this Texas facility to dispose of low level radioactive waste and that kind of sent some alarm bells going on in my head thinking, oh, my gosh, what's happening? And I think this is in response to some -- maybe some disruptions or slowdown due to Covid. So they don't have -they're not planning or don't foresee the need to shut down but they were mandated to write a contingency plan and the contingency plan includes things like having emergency contacts, and then looking for where other ways could be diverted should they be shut down, and it sounds like there's not really any good solution. And one of the recommendations that came out of that report that I thought was interesting that they were encouraging people who -- or states who have facilities that generate Class B and Class C

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waste, and a lot of that would include, like, industrial gages and therapeutic x-ray stuff - stuff, that's my technical term -- that they were encouraging them not to stock pile but just, you know, get their waste sent off for disposal. So I just found that interesting, I thought I would share with you guys. I have the report if you want me to email it to you, I'd be happy to do that. There's no "the sky is not falling down" it's just something that's -- that I found interesting.

Any comments or questions or concerns about that report?

So the recommendation from our Comptroller was to go back to the reimbursement model which is we will be reimbursing DEQ on a quarterly basis for time and effort of the Administrator. guys have a copy of that professional services agreement of the draft that was prepared. Invoicing and payment is Item No. 5 on that agreement. When this went through review by our internal folks, they added some information, some more detail on the termination clauses, the choice of law, the choice of venue for any disputes. What else did they do? I think that was about it. So this -- our current agreement expires June 30th, so this would become effective July 2021, and -- for a year and then we could renew them at your option. So we need to vote on whether or not to approve this new

So if you want to start from the top, we have travel and meeting expenses, that's if we meet in person or we have any meetings in person and we have to send one of the Commissioners to, that is what that's used for.

Legal counsel is for Kendra, any work 1 that she does. 2 Accounting. We went ahead and 3 budgeted \$15,000 this year because they are 4 cutting us a deal just to do all three 5 together. 6 Meeting and transcription is for 7 Christy Myers, our court reporter. 8 Again, website maintenance through 9 Cecilia, \$2500. 10 Our P.O. Box where we receive all of 11 our mail. 12 Dues and subscriptions, that's for the 13 LLW Forum that we're a part of, and that's 14 \$9500 a year. 15 Insurance is \$5,000 to Hartford. 16 And our rent and storage for the year 17 runs about \$1379.
